UCONN 13-YALE 6


Saturday, September 25, 1965 was a day that will long be remembered by the University of Connecticut fans. For it was on this day that the oldest record in intercollegiate football was shattered.


The day was warm and the excitement mounted as the seconds ticked away on the scoreboard. As the final second marked the history making victory of the UConn Huskies over the Yale Bulldogs, the delirious Connecticut fans poured onto the field to greet the victorious team.

On 86 previous occasions dating back to 1875, no team from within the state of Connecticut had succeeded in a win over Yale in football. The last 16 games in this 90 year stretch of Eli triumphs were recorded at the expense of the University of Connecticut football teams.




Connecticut Co-Captains John Billingslea (42) and Jerry McWeeny (above) are introduced to Yale Capt. David Laidley by Referee Walter School.











Gene Campbell, after intercepting a Yale pass on the 35 yard line, runs for the winning touchdown.










Halfback John Billingslea and Tackle Gerald McWeeny—Co-Captains of the University of Connecticut football team.












Defensive end Hassett (88) wrestles a Rutgers back to the ground




Quarterback Dave Whaley (12) on the move for a gain of five yards against Rutgers.









Scott Kehoe picks up good yardage before running into a maze of UMass defenders.








Halfback Gary Blackney (43) takes a hand-off from quarterback Dave Whaley (12) gaining two yards on the play against Temple.



Halfback John Billingslea views the game from the sidelines while Head Coach Forzano plans game strategy.






